Smoking Regulations in Hawai'i : The Healthy Air & Workplaces Law

The State of Hawai'i has enacted The Smoke Free Hawaii law, designed to protect the health and wellbeing of people who do not want to be subjected to secondhand smoke. Smokers may still purchase and use smoke-producing tobacco products in areas other than those designated as smoke-free under the law. The law is effective on Nov. 16, 2006.

Halekulani and the Waikiki Parc Hotel:

All areas under roof including guest rooms, guest room lanais, restaurants, lounges, banquet rooms and public areas will be designated smoke free. Additionally, the Halekulani pool deck and pool lawn will also become non-smoking.

At Halekulani, we have designated a smoking area for our guests and patrons. This area will be located near our Gatehouse entrance adjacent to the Kalia Road waterfall. This area, in compliance with Hawaii State law, is twenty feet from the hotels covered entrance and is located within Halekulani's property line.

At the Waikiki Parc Hotel, we have designated a smoking area for our guests and patrons. This area will be located on the 8th floor, to the right of Parc Lanai from the hours of 6:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. This area, in compliance with Hawaii State law, is twenty feet from the hotels covered entrance and is located within Waikiki Parc Hotel's property line. Please be advised that smoking is also prohibited on the 8th floor pool deck.

Where is smoking prohibited under the law:

- In enclosed or partially enclosed facilities
 - owned by the state or the counties.
 - places that are open to the public, including private businesses.
 - places of employment, including private membership clubs if they are a place of employment.
- In Hawai'i airports, from cabin to curb.
- Within 20 feet of doorways, windows and ventilation intakes in order to prevent secondhand smoke drifting into enclosed areas.
- In the enclosed, partially enclosed and seating areas of sports arenas, outdoor arenas, stadiums and amphitheaters.
